R.C.I.A. Adults seeking Baptism or to make their Profession of Faith and other sacraments should contact the Director of Religious Education to register.


Reconciliation is available upon request.



Moving forward with the Lord on our side

Can you be a witness of your faith in Jesus Christ?

In the month of April, I visited my home country Tanzania. The first Sunday I was given an opportunity to preside an early Sunday mass at 6:30am in my home Parish. Even though my home parish Church is small, however, it was packed to the fullest until there were no seats left; some even stood or sat outside of the Church.

My heart was filled with a "good jealousy" and wished our Church, St. Simon of Cyrene, could be the same, be filled up to its capacity every Sunday. I wondered, "what are they doing to make this Church flourish like a garden of roses? Why are they flourish, and why are we declining? Why are they increasing in number, and we are decreasing in number? I wondered while thinking we are both believing in the same God and recite the same creed every Sunday. Why?

While there might be many reasons to the why of my questions, however, one thing that I learned was that the Church in Africa is flourishing because of the small Christian Communities. Most of the Parishes are divided into small Christian communities that are locally organized to promote domestic faith from the grass-root level.

Every Saturday morning, members of the small Christian community meet to pray as a domestic Church, read scripture and after the scripture reading, every participant regardless of life's stage, is allowed to give a personal witness of how the scripture speaks to them. In other words, they do Lectio Divina at first place and later discusses the affairs of their community every Saturday.

Now, these meetings in small Christian Communities, allow individuals to share their journey of faith and give testimony about how God has been working in their lives or how he has been helping them grow in their Christian or sacramental lives. As a result, many people have turned to become witnesses, many have moved from being followers to witnesses. Still, many have renewed their faith simply by becoming part of this movement of living one's Christian life committedly by being comfortable to share their faith with or to others, that is, to talk about the goodness of the Lord publicly.

Indeed, by becoming part of the renewal movement, becoming part of the giving testimony of one's faith and by solidifying the small Christian communities, the Church in Africa has grown to become a vibrant prosperous Church.

Well in 1965 the Vatican Council II, issued a **Decree on the Church's Missionary Activity [Ad Gentes Divinus]** and in its article #11, it stated, "*All Christians by the examples of their lives and the witness of the world, wherever they live, have an obligation to manifest the new man which they put on in baptism, and reveal the power of the Holy Spirit by whom they were strengthened at confirmation, so that others, seeing their good works, may glorify the Father.*" Indeed, this article suggest that, it is through Christian's good works, that others may see God in us glorify Him. Therefore, I urge all of us to strive to transform ourselves from being followers to witness of our faith, to strive to manifest the new man or woman that we became after our baptism and to strive to allow God to be seen by others in our life. So I urge you to be a witness to your faith, share the gift of faith you received through baptism and let God be seen in your life. Peace be with you.

SERMON: FIFTEENTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME (CYCLE B)

Do you remember the last time you packed for a trip, a long journey? You had to think of several things. What's the weather to be like? Will I need a heavy jacket? How many changes of clothes do I need? Many people ask those questions before they begin their trip. And when they are at last on their way, questions run through their mind. Did I pack my ticket? Did I forget my medicine? Where did I leave my glasses? Now, wait a moment. Try to imagine how much more difficult your packing would be, if you had no idea where you were going, if you had no idea how long you would be gone.

- In today's Gospel, Jesus Christ sent his disciples out on mission, on just that kind of journey. Imagine the surprise of the disciples when Jesus tells them to leave most of their possessions behind. This was an urgent mission; and it was passed on to us, because our Teacher, Jesus Christ, tells us to undertake a similar mission.
- St. Paul describes the mission of Jesus as having three steps. First, God chose us, his people, before the world began. God chose us to be holy, God-like, and loving. Second, through Jesus Christ, by God's plan, we have been redeemed, forgiven, and empowered. Third, God's plan is that we will bring all things together, with Jesus Christ as our head.
- So, Jesus could say, "Peace I give you, Peace I leave you, peace no heart can hold. Joy that knows no rest or ending, joy till now untold." The peace of Christ is the beginning of our calling, the rationale for our journey, the meaning of our mission.
- People confined to a hospital bed, people shut in at home, people unable to walk outside—yes, even those people have the same mission. By their witness, by their prayers, by their suffering, they speak eloquently to the world of the power of the Lord. That witness can be more convincing than any sermon, more beautiful than any public talk, more persuasive than any spoken word.
- Jesus sent the disciples out two by two. They were not meant to be alone. And when Jesus sends you out into the world, you are not alone, either. This is why there is a sponsor at baptism. This is why the Rite of Christian Initiation involves other people. This is why your witness to the world must always have the support of at least one other person.
- Your message may be rejected. And your message may be accepted, if not now, perhaps someday later on. But the important thing is that you accept your calling, to evangelization, to witness, to testifying to the truth.
- We pray, then, to the Lord Jesus Christ: "We will wait and share your promise in the gift you give. Till you come again in glory, in your word, we live."


