Marriages: Couples must contact the Pastor six to twelve months prior to a proposed wedding date. Attendance at a Pre-Cana Session will be required.


Ministry to Sick and Shut-In: If a member of the church is in a hospital, nursing home or homebound, please call the parish office if they would like to receive the Eucharist.



St. Monica: A model of mothers and worthy wives

On August 27th of every year, The Church celebrate the feast of St. Monica, the mother of St. Augustine. St. Monica was born in the year 332 AD., in Tagaste, North Africa [present day Algeria], from a God-fearing parents. Therefore, her early childhood formation made her to be a God-fearing woman, righteous, a woman of peace, faithful wife and a loving mother. She died at the age of fifty-five in 387 AD. Monica is recognized to be among the first few African women to be canonized as Saints.

As a wife, Monica was married to Patricius, a man of honor, but who did not believe in Jesus Christ. Indeed, it is said in thick and thin, Monica respected, obeyed her husband and labored to gain him to God and reclaim him from his vices. Later, after the prayers of Monica, Patricius was converted, baptized and accepted Jesus as his Lord and Savior. He died in the year 371 AD.

Monica was known to be a peace maker, patient and tolerant to the temper of her husband. She would maintain calmness and not discuss anything with him, when her husband was in high temper. However, when his temper cooled down, Monica discussed with him wisely the reason that brought misunderstanding between them. Her attitude of peace making, gained for her respect and love not only from her husband but also from her neighbors. Monica was also gifted with a spirit of tender-heart. For she was delighted to serve the poor.

Monica had three children. namely, Augustine, Navigius and Perpetua. Monica is famously known as the mother of St. Augustine of Hippo. History tells us that she cared well her children and made sure they grew up in piety and in the fear of God. However, as he grew up, Augustine abandoned his faith. For thirty years her mother prayed and cried for him unceasingly until he was converted to Christianity in August of 386 AD. St. Augustine admitted that his conversion was influenced by the prayers and cries of her mother and the preaching of St. Ambrose, his spiritual master. St. Augustine was baptized by St. Ambrose on the eve of easter vigil in the year 387 AD.

Therefore, through the intercession of St. Monica, let's pray for our mothers that they may not give up on their sons and daughters as they pass through the phases of life, especially when the life of faith seems to be less important to them. **God bless** you.

SERMON: TWENTY SECOND SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME (CYCLE B)

All of us are concerned about crime. We are concerned about mugging, burglary, carjacking—all kinds of crime. Not long ago, a leading politician visited a Baptist church and there said that the passage of his crime bill was the will of God. After some changes, the bill was introduced to the Congress a second time; and then, it passed. The bill became law. Now, I ask you. Was the politician correct? Was his bill the will of God? You might think that the people who voted against it did not think it was the will of God. In fact, many people who voted for the bill would not go so far as to say it was the will of God.

- So, that's what we talk about today. How do you know if something is the will of God or not? How do you know if something is right or wrong?
- The Second Reading says that every worthwhile gift, every genuine benefit comes down from heaven, from the Father of lights, the Lord God of power and might. But that begs the question. How do you know what is a worthwhile gift? How do you know what is good?
- We can say that God reveals to us his truth. That's right. God did that, in a wonderful way. But God's revelation doesn't guide us clearly on many important matters: casino gambling and the law, smoking and lung cancer, racial discrimination and affirmative action, business ethics, medical ethics, and more. Now, if God intended his revelation to be all-sufficient, then God should have spoken more clearly. Isn't that so? In general, there should be no divisions among Christians because his Word, his revelation, would be clear. The meaning would be beyond dispute.
- The Gospel itself speaks to our concern. With regard to all the commandments of the Jewish Law, Jesus teaches that what is important is what's in the heart, what's inside. It is the inner attitude that matters. Certainly, in his preaching, Jesus did not mean to overturn the Law or to change anything. He called people to a more faithful observance of the Law. Like Isaiah and other prophets, Jesus wants people to be converted in their heart and soul, their very being.
- Here is the truth that comes from the Gospel: It is the risen Christ who speaks in the Church who changes the Law. Abstaining from pork, circumcision, washing of hands—the risen Christ in the Church does not require this of us. The Law itself is now changed, by the authority of the Church.

Therefore, humbly welcome the Word. Discern the will of God. Reflect on the Scripture; it has power to save you. That means the voice of the Church, the strength of our tradition, the heritage of our faith. Act upon this Word: Give God thanks and praise and glory.

God works in ways so that we cannot find comfort in our own works. We don't need to worry about how it will all work out; we only need to trust God through it all. We may not feel excited through life's darkest times, and that's okay. God doesn't expect us to fake a smile when we're facing turmoil, but he does offer us his presence for peace and comfort.

God's Words offer simple steps to follow for those who seek His will. *"Rejoice always, pray continually, give*

thanks in all circumstances; for this is God's Will for you in Christ Jesus"
