Decision was Made at the Door

A few days ago, Deacon Pouncy, Deacon Greg, and I went to a Ford car dealer in Bourbonnais to buy a new van for St. Simon of Cyrene Church's food pantry. When we arrived at the dealership, we found a staff member at the door waiting to welcome us. He introduced himself and asked about our reason for visiting the dealership. We expressed our intention of buying a passenger's van. We also asked for a Staff member that spoke with us on the phone.

Instantaneously, two more staff members came to welcome us upon learning that we had chosen their dealership to do business with them. Indeed, we witnessed an inexpressible joy and happiness in their faces. It's easy to say that they were happy because they anticipated our business transaction, but I believe their joy stemmed from seeing the Church folks coming to engage with them in the matter of business.

Both Deacon Pouncy, Deacon Greg and I felt that "this was the right place to do business." Honestly, this decision was made easily right at the entrance door of the dealership, simply because we felt that we were treated with respect, love, and joy as if we were kings. The adage that says, "hospitality is the end game of everything," rang true to us.

This experience made me wonder and wish for our Churches to embody this kind of radical hospitality. The radical hospitality of being extreme generous in the way we welcome others into our Churches. Well, we should welcome joyfully those who come to our Churches as if we are welcoming Christ. A lesson I learned from this experience is that, as a Church, we are demanded to change our culture of hospitality by dedicating ourselves in showing respect, love, joy, happiness and care to all those who are coming to our Church just like the folks at a car dealership did to us. I believe that someone can be transformed by a smile of love or a sense of being welcomed joyfully at the doors of our Church.

I believe the newcomers to the Church decide whether to stay or choose the Church as their home Church based on the first impression they receive at the door. A nice service with a good homily and music has an impact for one who is searching for a home Church, but a welcoming and hospitable Church is a dealer maker. A vibrant worshiping community that has a strong and vibrant hospitality ministry which welcomes people at the door and makes them feel at home as they come to worship on Sunday, is more valuable and impactful than a cold one with no hospitable attitude.

SERMON: TWENTY-FIFTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME (CYCLE B)

In the Gospel today, you heard how Jesus Christ foretold his own suffering, death, and Resurrection. As you know, the disciples did not understand his teaching; they were more concerned about who was more important among them. It is the same with us today.

- Often, we do not understand why we have to endure trouble or pain. We deny it. We reject it. We fight it. When the COVID epidemic broke out, some government officials did not speak the truth. Leaders were more concerned about making themselves look good; and they didn't want to accept that there was a problem. Denial is something we all engage in, refusal to accept the truth.
- So often, if we want to learn a new language, acquire skill in playing an instrument, understand a different culture, we reject the trouble involved. We choose to do something else, something easier. In the case of friendship, we fail to work on the relationship. We fail to put out the effort needed to bring resolution of a problem. We talk to other people about it but neglect to talk to the one person we should talk to. That's because we avoid what is difficult and choose what is easy. We are afraid of risk, of being hurt by some, of being rejected. We don't want suffering or pain or trouble or inconvenience. All that is natural to us, as it was to the disciples.
- By the same token, it is hard for us to understand what Jesus Christ is saying to us. It is difficult for us to accept what the Church may be teaching, especially if it is not in accord with the culture in which we live. Sometimes, Jesus Christ or the Catholic Church will ask us to think, to look differently at a situation, to reconsider what we are doing. And again and again, we choose not what is difficult but what is easy.
- Clearly, Jesus is teaching that the path to happiness for him and for us is through suffering, through rejection by other people, and through sacrifice. This is why we fast, why we do penance, why we pray intensely, why we study, why we meditate, why we continue learning all through life.
- What is the origin of war? Why do nations need powerful armies and quantities of weapons? Why is there divorce and abandonment and neglect and abuse? The Second Reading, the Epistle of St. James, gives an answer. The brother of Jesus says that where jealousy and selfish ambition exist, there is disorder, in fact, and every foul practice. You covet, he says. You kill and are envious. You fight and wage war. Is he not right? Are not those words true?

The fruit of righteousness, the harvest of justice, is sown in peace for those who cultivate peace. This is wisdom from above. This is hope for a weary world. This is the answer to ongoing war. This is what we need, in our country, in our city, and in our homes.

As soon as you realize, as soon as you believed John 3:16 you got saved. As soon as you believe God so loved the world that he gave his only begotten son, that whoever believes in him should not perish but have everlasting life. As soon as you believe that you were saved.


