



# Why Are You Worried and Anxious About Many Things?

In the Gospel of Luke 10:38-42, we are told the story of Jesus visiting the home of the two sisters Martha and Mary. Traditionally, Martha and Mary are known as the sisters of Lazarus, a man who was brought to life by Jesus as mentioned in the Bible [John 11:1-44]. According to the Gospel of John, Martha and Mary are identified as living in a place called Bethany, near Jerusalem (John 11:1-5). John also describes Mary as "the one who had anointed the Lord with perfumed oil and dried his feet with her hair" (John 11:2).

Jesus' visit to Martha and Mary was meant to be a joyful time of fellowship. It was a time for conversation and laughter. According to Luke, while Martha welcomed Jesus into their home and served Him, Mary sat at Jesus' feet, listening to Him speak. Mary was sitting at the same feet she had once anointed with perfume, as described by John.

Character-wise, Martha appears to be generous and hardworking, but Mary was more contemplative. After welcoming Jesus, Martha became busy and burdened with serving, possibly preparing food and drink for Jesus and His disciples. Overwhelmed by duties and responsibilities, Martha complained to Jesus, saying, "Lord, do you not care that my sister has left me by myself to do the serving?"

Martha expresses her frustration to Jesus, feeling as though He might not care about her struggles. It is likely that Martha felt a bit jealous of Mary. Seeing Jesus and Mary conversing, laughing, and enjoying each other's company may have stimulated feelings of what the Spanish call "celosa," meaning jealousy. This is a normal and common feeling within each one of us. Like many of us, Martha's frustration may have stemmed from feeling unnoticed or unappreciated.

However, Martha could have chosen to sit with Jesus, just as Mary did, rather than overwhelming herself with tasks. Although the Gospel of Luke does not explicitly state Jesus' purpose for the visit, we can assume that His intention was to deepen His relationship with them, not to burden Martha with worry and anxieties.

Jesus came to this house to bring peace and the Good News of the Kingdom and not to place blame. Indeed, many of us Christians, like Martha, sometimes become anxious and worried about so many things of this world that we forget our primary responsibility as followers of Christ; that is, to spend time with Jesus by sitting at his feet and listening to Him. Truly, this story reminds us that amid life's busyness, we are called to pause, sit at Jesus' feet and listen to His Word. Let's strive to prioritize our relationship with Christ even when the world demands so much from us. God bless you.

## SERMON: TWENTY-EIGHTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME (CYCLE B)

Does faith give wisdom? Does prayer bring us to maturity?

Well, the Sacred Scripture you heard today, about wisdom, is Jewish. The text said that wisdom is more precious than sight, more valuable than good health. I think you would agree. In old age, wouldn't you rather be mentally competent, above all? Wouldn't that be most important?

But these Sacred Scripture readings and texts like them, especially the Psalms, are prayed faithfully by Jews, some of whom who are violent. The Muslims pray to the same God, five times a day. They pray for obedience to the will of God, above all, for peace. Yet some of them are also violent. These people are lacking in wisdom.

When the troops of Oliver Cromwell went through Ireland, killing men, women, and children, burning homes and villages, wreaking havoc and devastation everywhere, they began each day with the singing of Psalms: "All people that on earth do dwell." Yes, they were very devout, very faithful to their prayer. These soldiers also were lacking in wisdom.

What I suggest to you is that people think of their ethnic group as more important than their faith. If they don't have an ethnic group, then they create such a group out of their religious affiliation. There is an in-group, those who belong, and an outgroup, those who don't. (I suspect that in Italy, for many, the ingroup is the family, not the nation or the country as such.)

But wisdom says something else. Maturity comes from the Word of God, a double-edged sword that challenges both Jew and Muslim alike. The Word of God indeed gives wisdom but precisely through and in the Church. Our human nature cannot achieve happiness by itself. That's why wealth can be an obstacle to happiness, like so many other things. In fact, salvation is not easy or simple. But with God all things are possible.

There is one case of hope, and I must pass it on to you. In South Africa, under the leadership of Bishop Tutu, there was a national committee of reconciliation. When power shifted from the White minority to the Black majority, people were called to publicly admit their crimes. And then they would be forgiven; they would not be punished. This is remarkable. Unlike what happened in the Congo and in Zimbabwe and elsewhere, there were no incidents of mass slaughter or violence. Now, this is not easy. Could you forgive someone who killed your mother? Could you absolve someone who did something to your sister? But the people in South Africa did exactly that, Black and White alike—because they are deeply Christian; because the Word of God, Jesus Christ, enabled them to do it. That was accomplished not just by Bishop Tutu but by the people themselves, Protestant and Catholic, old and young, Black and White. Not Nelson Mandela, not DeClerk, not Bishop Tutu, but God through Jesus Christ made this happen. In fact, with God all things are possible.

The important thing, then, is not our ethnic group, not our in -group, not our national identity. It is our faith, our Catholic faith, our common faith. That is our wisdom incarnate, within the Body of Christ. Let us stand and profess that faith together.


