Every Priest is Taken Among Men

A few years ago, as I was finishing high school, I was ready to embark on a new academic journey at a university. Deep in my heart, I had a strong desire to become a medical doctor, but at the same time, I felt a pull toward the priesthood.

It was around that time I met Sr. Jane Nugi, who introduced me to the idea of priesthood. She told me it was possible to be both a priest and a medical doctor. I thought that combining both callings would be incredible, so I decided to join the seminary. After years of formation, I was ordained as a priest, becoming fully immersed in the priesthood and leaving behind the idea of becoming a medical doctor.

Priesthood opened up a profound world that can only be experienced by becoming a priest. As priests, we are called to make vows or promises to live a life of celibacy, poverty, and obedience to God, to our Bishops and Superiors. Priests freely choose this path with the intention of dedicating their entire lives to the service of the Kingdom of God, the Church, and the care of the community of believers. Priests are called to be people of prayer, offering prayers for their own sins and for the sins of others. They work for the Church, which is the living sacrament of Christ, as messengers of hope, proclaimers of the Good News, ambassadors of faith, and instruments of love and charity.

Interestingly, in the eyes of children, priests are often mistakenly seen as "God," because they represent God and speak on His behalf during church services, in the celebration of the sacraments, and through prayers and blessings. On two occasions, to my surprise, I was called "God" by little children. This experience made me realize that, to young and innocent children, priests are powerful symbols of God's presence in their lives. Moreover, to many people, priests not only represent God but are also seen as the hands, eyes, ears and the feet of Christ to those in need.

The biblical image of the priesthood is rooted in the Book of Hebrews [Heb 5:1-14]. In this chapter, the choice of priests is described as follows: "Every high priest is taken from among men and made their representative before God, to offer gifts and sacrifices for sins. He is able to deal patiently with the ignorant and erring, for he himself is beset by weakness, and so, for this reason, must make sin offerings for himself as well as for the people. No one takes this honor upon himself but only when called by God, just as Aaron was. In the same way, it was not Christ who glorified himself in becoming high priest, but rather the one who said to him: 'You are my Son; this day I have begotten you,' just as he says in another place: 'You are a priest forever according to the order of Melchizedek.'"

So, every priest that you know, comes from a family like yours and has parents and relatives like yours. He is a man from a regular family. Now, let's promote vocation to priesthood among our young people. God bless you.

SERMON: TWENTY-SEVENTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME (CYCLE B)

You hear today the message that God's creation includes marriage, sex, and family life. In other words, following the words of Jesus in the Gospel, we acknowledge that family life is part of God's plan for us, from the beginning.

When you think of the doctrine of creation, the most important element in that doctrine is the fact of dependence, in the present. The doctrine of creation has not so much to do with historical origins of marriage or what God actually did with Adam and Eve. No, the main point is that in the here and now we need God, in order to find happiness in these three areas of marriage, sex, and family life. We know that our human nature was designed by God our creator.

Is it not true that so many of us live by social pressure, by conformity, by absorption into the general culture? Do not many of us simply think in accord with what others around us think? Are we not, by and large, formed by the world of media, school, and friends? It is strange, then, that we do not acknowledge our dependence. We often think of ourselves as autonomous, as free, as independent agents, with our own ideas and values. Every generation does this, and every generation is deceiving itself.

In fact, we need to rely on God, on his Word in Scripture, on his help given us in the Catholic Church, on his wisdom expressed in our common faith and practice. In fact, we rely either on the general American culture or on the Church, one or the other. In fact, we live in the City of God or in the City of Man, as St. Augustine put it. Sometimes, we live in both cultures; and so we experience tension, confusion, and doubt.

Concretely, in view of today's Gospel, we consider the question of marriage and divorce. Note what Jesus says in the Gospel. His teaching is much the same as the practice in the Western Church today, the Roman Catholic Church. Neither husband nor wife can divorce the spouse and marry someone else. It is not divorce that is condemned, as such, but rather remarriage after divorce, while the first spouse is still living.

Now, suppose two people cannot live together. They just don't get along, at all. They have serious reasons for separating. As far as the Gospel is concerned, yes, they can separate, even get divorced. But they remain married and so cannot marry again, while the spouse is living.

Are there any exceptions to this teaching? Yes, there are two. First, the Eastern Catholic Church, today recognized in the Greek Orthodox Church, had a different practice. These Christians say that marriage can die and fail, through human fault. Both Christians who seek a divorce go to confession, do penance, and repent of their sin. Then the Church actually grants a true divorce, with the right to remarry. The Western Church was in communion with the East for many centuries, and this different practice was never condemned in the West. Nor does it today pose an obstacle to reunion. So, perhaps we in the West could also someday accept this interpretation of the Gospel. For now, in the Catholic Church, there is only the second exception of annulment. In the West, marriage is understood as a legal contract between two individuals. So, you can legally recognize that people were unable to commit themselves in a legal contract; the most common cause is psychic incapacity—one or both of the individuals were unable to form the marriage bond. These are two exceptions to the teaching of Christ in today's Gospel.

2 Peter 3:9 (ESV) The Lord is not slow to fulfill his promise as some count slowness, but is patient toward you, not wishing that any should perish, but that all should reach repentance.

This verse is talking about when Jesus will return. It is saying the Jesus is not slow in coming back, He has a plan. He is being patient, waiting for more people to repent and be saved, rather than perish. In other words, Jesus is not waiting to return until we have better worship, fellowship, discipleship or ministry. He is waiting to return until the last person in His plan repents and is saved. Reaching the lost with salvation is the main purpose of believers in this life. So, let's look at the purpose of people who do not vet know Jesus.
