The Day of Tribulation

In the Gospel of Mark 13:24-32, Jesus speaks to His disciples about the days of tribulation. He says, "On those days, He says, the sun will grow dark, the moon will cease to shine, and the stars will fall from the sky [Mk.13:24-2]. These images symbolize a profound darkness that will cover the world and shake the entire universe.

When we imagine days like these, it's natural to think of confusion, panic, and fear gripping humanity. We are unaccustomed to a world plunged into total darkness and chaos, a world where the order we know disappears, giving way to uncertainty. It is in these moments of fear that we often abandon what is truly valuable and essential, seeking instead to protect our lives and cling to a false sense of security. Yet, Jesus offers us hope: "Suddenly, the Son of Man will come with power and glory" [Mk. 13:26].

He will not come alone but will send His angels to gather His chosen ones: those men and women who, despite trials and tribulations, have not abandoned their faith or trust in God. Here, we find a promise of redemption and restoration, a sign that chaos is not the end of the story.

Therefore, even as we face times of confusion and difficulty, let us remember that God remains in control of everything. He will not abandon us because His plan for humanity is one of salvation and eternal love. Our task is to resist allowing the devil to sow confusion and fear in our lives.

Instead, we must hold fast to our faith and trust that God, in His infinite time, wisdom, and power, will guide us through the darkness into the light. What matters is that we remain steadfast and remember that tribulation is not only a test but also an opportunity to demonstrate our fidelity and faith in the Lord.

While others may rush to seek answers or easy solutions, we are called to become the beacons of hope, remembering that Christ's promise is true: "*He will come with power and glory*" and will make all things new. Let us trust in Him, for victory is already assured for those who persevere and refuse to succumb to fear, placing their confidence in God instead.

SERMON: CHRIST THE KING (CYCLE B)

In accord with the season of the liturgical year, we look forward to the Second Coming of Jesus Christ, our King, our Master, and our Lord.

- God has made his Son known to us as the Messiah, the Son of Man, that is, as fully human. To us, Christ the King is not known as a dictator, a boss, a tyrant. Christ is known to us as a leader, a teacher, as someone who came not to be served but to serve. The Epistle to the Hebrews says he is like us in all things but sin. But he is also a man who did great things for us and through whom God showed his glory.
- Who, then, is Christ the King? And what difference does he make? The second reading said he is the faithful witness, the one who lived and died for the truth, who freed us by his blood, who made us priests.
- You know what a witness is. Consider the man who lost six of his children in a sudden accident on I-94 near Milwaukee. His faith is evident in his words and in his prayer. That man is a witness to truth. That's exactly what Christ the King is: he teaches us by his actions as much as by his sermons. Christ testifies to the power of God.
- In fact, says Scripture, Christ made us priests. That means that by our baptism, we are rendered worthy of offering worship to God in a unique way. Because we welcome the presence of Christ, because we celebrate the Word of Christ, because we belong to the baptized body of Christ, we can pray in the same way that Christ prays, with heart and soul.
- Do you doubt this? Hear the words of the Gospel. Christ the King says the whole reason I have come into the world is to testify to the truth. You can think of Christ in a thousand ways. If I were to ask you to describe him, you would have a thousand answers. But here is the answer given by Christ himself. He says he is a witness, a teacher, a prophet. Those are his words. And that is his mission. Not to judge us but to teach us. Not to correct us but to enlighten us. Not to dominate us but to help us live. That is why he said you shall know the truth, and the truth will set you free.
- In the hymn, What You Gave Us for the Taking, we sing that these our gifts are by Christ made royal. That does not just refer to the bread and wine. It means that Christ renders holy our highest thoughts, our noblest ideals, our best aspirations. He takes them to himself and offers them to the Father.
- This is why we pray with Christ. This is why we live by his words, which will never pass away. This is why we think of Christ as our mediator with God, our intercessor, our advocate. That's why Jesus Christ is King.

Our whole life is transformed by him who is our life and our light. He is the living image of God, the final Word spoken in the fullness of time. Our faith may change. Our world may change. Our fortunes may change. But through it all, he is with us in every moment, in every hour, bringing hope for heavy hearts, bringing faith to a world of doubt, bringing light to a dark and dreary life. Jesus Christ is King. Jesus Christ is the same, yesterday, today, and forever.
