

The Multiple Effects of the Sacrament of Confirmation

The sacrament of Confirmation has many effects on Catholic Christians. Its primary effect is that it confers upon those who receive it worthily an increase in sanctifying grace. Sanctifying grace is a supernatural gift from God that renders a person holy and pleasing in His sight. Through this grace, those who are spiritual infants become spiritually mature, and the simple citizens of Christ's Kingdom become Christ's soldiers. This increase in sanctifying grace also strengthens the moral virtues of prudence, justice, temperance, and courage; the theological virtues of faith, hope, and love; and the gifts of the Holy Spirit: wisdom, understanding, counsel, fortitude, knowledge, piety, and fear of the Lord.

Secondly, the sacrament imprints an indelible character upon the soul of the confirmand, effecting a real, lasting transformation. For this reason, confirmation is received only once, as it leaves a permanent mark on the soul. It empowers one to bear witness to the faith through public profession in both word and deed, just as the Apostles became fearless confessors of their faith on the Day of Pentecost. They preached the resurrected Jesus in a hostile environment without fear of persecution, practiced the corporal works of mercy even when resources were scarce, and were willing to die for their faith in Christ. Through confirmation, we are called to become strong in our faith, following their example.

Thirdly, the sacrament of Confirmation prepares the confirmands to become missionary disciples who continue Christ's work in the world, seeking the salvation of souls and drawing others to Him. This mission calls the confirmands to imitate Christ, to embody His presence, and to proclaim the Good News of salvation to the whole world.

In summary, the Catechism of the Catholic Church #1303 states: "...Confirmation brings an increase and deepening of baptismal grace: it roots us more deeply in the divine filiation which makes us cry, "Abba! Father!"; it unites us more firmly to Christ; it increases the gifts of the Holy Spirit in us; it renders our bond with the Church more perfectly; it gives us a special strength of the Holy Spirit to spread and defend the faith by word and action as true witness of Christ, to confess the name of Christ boldly, and to never to be ashamed of the Cross." [Catechism of the Catholic Church, Second Edition, p. 330]


SERMON: THIRTY-FIRST SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME (CYCLE B)

Today, you hear the Shema, "Hear, O Israel" as the central profession of our faith, our creed that there is one God, only one, and that we are to love him with all our being. It is Jesus Christ himself who commends this faith to us. The Shema, then, is as Christian as it is Jewish.

- We venerate Jesus as a teacher in this regard, surely. But the Second Reading today also gives the place of Jesus, within the Jewish tradition. This reading is from the Epistle to the Hebrews, that is, to Christians who think of themselves as Jewish, Christians who speak Greek but are, at the time of writing, part of the Jewish faith. They are addressed as Hebrews because at this time they still think of themselves as Jews, even though they accept Jesus as the Messiah.
- The teaching of the Epistle to the Hebrews is that Jesus is a priest, indeed a priest forever. That's no surprise to us. We already think we know what a priest is. I would venture most of us would define a priest as a sacred person, perhaps, someone who does holy things, someone who is set apart. That's a viewpoint common to both Catholic and Orthodox Christians. Yet the Epistle to the Hebrews says something different, both to its readers and to us.
- In these words of the New Testament, Jesus is a priest because he is praying for us. Yes, that's right. Today's text says that Jesus can save people who come to God through him. Jesus can do this, says the Epistle to the Hebrews, because he lives forever; he is risen. He will never die again. For this reason, Jesus can always pray for us, always intercede for us with God, always be our mediator. The author of the Epistle to the Hebrews says that Jesus is not like the priests of the Old Testament; those priests offered animal sacrifices again and again. Jesus doesn't do that and doesn't need to do that. His one offering on the cross is greater than all the sacrifices that took place in the temple of Jerusalem. Now, those sacrifices are over and done. The temple is destroyed, and those sacrifices have ended.
- In the perspective of the New Testament, especially in the Epistles, Jesus is understood to be on our side, our advocate, like a lawyer who argues on our behalf. The Epistle to the Hebrews says he "forever lives to make intercession" for us.

It is through the humanity of Jesus, says the Second Vatican Council, that our salvation was achieved. That's true not just in the past, in his death and Resurrection, but also in the present. Right now, here and now, Jesus Christ is interceding for us in the liturgy. Right now, our salvation is being brought about. That's why we're here. It is in the liturgy, especially the Eucharist, that we pray through him, with him, and in him. In our Roman Rite, every Eucharistic Prayer ends with these words. The First Eucharistic Prayer, the Roman Canon, ends all its prayers with the words per Christum Dominum nostrum, "through Christ our Lord." Our prayer, here and now, is effective because Christ himself is praying with us and for us. He is indeed an excellent teacher, as the Gospel says. He is also an excellent intercessor and mediator.


