Celebrating the Blessed Virgin Mary: Immaculate Conception and Our Lady of Guadalupe

In December, the Church is blessed to celebrate two significant Marian feasts: the Solemnity of the Immaculate Conception of the Blessed Virgin Mary on December 8th and the Feast of Our Lady of Guadalupe on December 12th. These celebrations highlight the profound role of the Blessed Virgin Mary in God's plan for humanity's salvation. Additionally, on January 1st, we will celebrate the Solemnity of Mary, the Mother of God, further emphasizing Mary's unique place in the life of the Church.

You may have noticed that the Immaculate Conception is described as a solemnity, while Our Lady of Guadalupe is a feast. What is the difference between these two liturgical celebrations? Why is one a solemnity and the other a feast?

In liturgical terms, solemnities are the highest-ranking celebrations in the Church. They commemorate the most important events, mysteries of faith, or saints of particular significance. Solemnities often begin with a vigil Mass the evening before, and the Gloria and Creed are always included in the liturgy. Some of the solemnities are Easter, Christmas, the Solemnity of Mary Mother of God, the Assumption, and the Immaculate Conception.

In contrast, feasts are of slightly lower rank but still celebrate important events in the lives of Christ, the Blessed Virgin Mary, or the Apostles. On feast days, the Gloria is recited, but the Creed is omitted. The following are the examples of some of the feasts: the Feast of the Transfiguration, the Feast of Sts. Peter and Paul, and the Feast of the Presentation of the Lord.

On the Solemnity of the Immaculate Conception, we honor the fact that the Blessed Virgin Mary was free from sin from the very first moment of her existence. The Church teaches that Mary was preserved from original sin at the moment of her conception, a grace given to her in anticipation of the salvation brought by Jesus Christ. The opening prayer for this solemnity reflects this profound truth, stating that God the Father prepared Mary to be a worthy mother for our Lord, allowing her to share in Christ's saving grace from the beginning of her life.

The Feast of Our Lady of Guadalupe honors the Blessed Virgin Mary as the Patroness of the Americas and a powerful symbol of hope, faith, and unity. Mary appeared to St. Juan Diego on Tepeyac Hill (modernday Mexico City) in 1531, requesting that a church be built in her honor. When Juan Diego relayed this message to the Bishop, he was dismissed. To confirm her request, Our Lady of Guadalupe, provided a miraculous sign; she filled Juan Diego's tilma, or cloak, with roses, an extraordinary occurrence in December and imprinted her image on it. This luminous and vibrant image is preserved to this day, a powerful testament to her intercession and love.

Our Lady of Guadalupe is celebrated as a symbol of God's love for the poor and marginalized. Through her intercession, countless souls have been drawn to Christ. She reminds us of God's abiding presence and Mary's role as mother to all. As we honor the Blessed Virgin Mary through these celebrations, may we deepen our faith and imitate her trust in God. May her example inspire us to remain steadfast in our own journey of faith. God bless you.

Sermon: Second Sunday of Advent (Cycle C)

In today's Mass, we call to mind the Holy Way, the path to God, the royal road to heaven that lies before us. Tell the faint-hearted, do not be afraid; your God will come and save you.

- Throughout the Bible, the New Testament and the Old Testament, we celebrate the fact that we journey to God as a people, as a nation, as a Church. We do not get there alone. Consider just a few examples how other people think differently from us individualistic Americans.
- In Japanese, there is no word for individual guilt. Yes, there is a word for shame, public embarrassment, disgrace. But there is no word for the concept of personal, individual responsibility. To us individualists, the Japanese language seems strange; that's because the concept of individual sin does not exist within the culture.
- Similarly, in Korea, people do not celebrate individual birthdays. That would seem inconceivably self-centered. Instead, everyone each year celebrates on the same day the fact that they are one year older.
- In the same way, individual guilt and individual prayer is not the main thing in Jewish writings, especially in the Bible. What matters most is the corporate sense, the group identity. Scripture says, for example, "Up, Jerusalem. Stand upon the heights." That is an invitation to the whole people, to gather as a people. In the song, I Lift My Soul, which is Psalm 25, the rabbis made a point that it is a prayer of the whole people. The word "I" is used because Israel is praying as one person; all of us are praying together, with the same mind and heart. Of course, that's the exact opposite of the way most Americans will understand I Lift My Soul. We think of ourselves as individuals, and we often pray as individuals. To the extent we do that, we will never enter the mind of Christ and never take on his attitude of prayer.
- When Scripture says "every valley shall be filled in, every mountain made low," that means that a highway will be cleared for God's people. Because we move together, we need room to travel. Similarly, the crooked paths shall be made straight; the rough ways, smooth. All humankind shall see the salvation of God. Throughout, the emphasis is on our common future, our shared destiny, our family's journey ahead.
- Today, the Catholic Church is in her springtime. The current revival of the liturgy is beyond comparison, in any century, in depth and in universality. We are coming to pray, once again, in the spirit of the best of our ancient tradition. That renewal of the liturgy is proceeding apace, in good time, with measured solemnity and peaceful progress.

People in Mexico and in the United States celebrate the Feast of Our Lady of Guadalupe on December 12. Mary is the Patron Saint of Mexico and Patroness of the Americas. Every year, thousands of people from all over the country make a pilgrimage to the Basilica in Mexico City. The day commemorates her apparition to Saint Juan Diego in the hills of Tepeyac in 1531. She asked him to go to the bishop and tell him that the Ever Virgin Mary, Mother of God, sent him to ask for a church to be built atop Tepeyac hill.

Today, as a sign of their devotion to Mary, many pilgrims travel to this site on their knees for many miles. They do this as a sign of their devotion to Mary and to show gratitude for favors received from her. Outside of the shrine there are groups of mariachis, folk musicians, and ethnic dancers who have come to celebrate. Inside, various priests and bishops from all over Mexico gather to celebrate Mass. In the evening, the entrance of the basilica is filled with pilgrims from different regions of the country. Many other fiestas or popular celebrations take place in honor of La Virgen dark-skinned Morena. or the Madonna, all over Mexico, Almost every household erects an altar to the Virgin Mary for the day and the faithful demonstrate their joy by lighting fireworks throughout their cities.

Mary's apparition in Mexico to Saint Juan Diego aided the Catholic Church's effort to bring the Gospel to the Americas. This is why the bishops of the United States affirm: "Mary embraces God's will and freely chooses to cooperate with God's grace, thereby fulfilling a crucial role in God's plan of salvation."
