The Importance of Preparation

"Prepare the way of the Lord; make his paths straight" is a powerful call that comes from the prophet Isaiah, urging his people to be ready for the day of the Lord. Isaiah understood the importance of preparation in people's lives. He passionately exhorts the faithful to "straighten in the desert a highway for the Lord." This colorful imagery carries the importance of preparing a welcoming path for God. It is a call to do something for the Lord and to transform our lives.

This call to action is echoed in the New Testament. The Gospels of Matthew 3:3, Mark 1:3, and Luke 3:4, repeat the decree: "Prepare the way of the Lord, make straight his paths." Certainly, these words are not merely about physical preparation but a spiritual readiness. It is a call to vigilance, a challenge to lay a solid foundation for the Lord's coming into our lives.

Preparation is indeed key to any success. It sets the stage for building anything worthwhile, for helping to anticipate challenges, and for developing plans to overcome them. Through preparation, one can research, estimate, and organize the resources needed for any task or responsibility. In the long run, preparation builds confidence because it serves as a rehearsal for what is to come. It transforms uncertainty into readiness to practical actions.

The Advent season embodies this theme as believers focus on preparing themselves for the coming of the Lord. Advent is a season of waiting and preparation, and it requires discipline, humility, and patience. Both preparation and waiting demand a steadfast heart and a willingness to trust in God's timing and not in human timing.

Dietrich Bonhoeffer, a renowned theologian, powerfully reflected on this idea when he said: "Waiting is an art that our impatient age has forgotten. It wants to break open the ripe fruit when it is hardly finished planting the shoot... For the greatest, most profound, tenderest things in the world, we must wait. It happens not here in a storm but according to the divine laws of sprouting, growing, and becoming."

As we journey through this season, let us embrace the art of preparation and waiting. Let us remain humble, disciplined, and patient, trusting that good things come to those who invest in preparation and await God's perfect timing. May we be ready to receive our Lord Jesus Christ with open hearts. God bless you.

Sermon: Third Sunday of Advent (Cycle C)

Throughout Advent, we reflect carefully on the shortcomings of this life, the things that need changing, the need for justice and judgment, the wars and struggles and conflicts that mark our lives. We are well aware of human misfortune, of disease, of poverty, of addiction, of troubles of all kinds, of lack of faith, of depression, of selfishness and greed. Yes, we yearn for the Second Coming of Jesus Christ, for the advent of his kingdom, for a better world and a better life.

- In answer to all this, St. Paul, alone in prison, writes us. He says, "Rejoice, I say it again, rejoice. Put all anxiety away from your minds. Then will God's own peace stand guard over your hearts and minds in Christ Jesus our Lord."
- In Advent, we treasure these words of St. Paul. He was a man of vision. He saw something that we often fail to see. St. Paul knew why Christ was coming again and why we look forward to that coming. The reason is given to us by Christ himself, who said "I have come that they may have life and have it more abundantly."
- Life itself, then, is meant to be a happy life, a gift from God. That is a life that this age cannot deliver, a joy that this country cannot provide, a peace that this world cannot give.
- Everyone here who has suffered severe illness, everyone here
 who has lost a parent or a close friend, everyone here who has
 known real tragedy—everyone here knows what it means to
 look forward to the Coming of Christ.
- You hear now the words of Kathleen Norris, from her book, Amazing Grace: A Vocabulary of Faith.

We know that marriages, families, communities, and nations often come together and discover their strength when some apocalypse has occurred, some new revelation of the fault lines in our lives. Hospital chaplains see this all the time. For some reason we human beings seem to learn best how to love when we're a bit broken, when our plans fall apart, when our myths of our self-sufficiency and goodness and safety are shattered. Apocalypse is meant to bring us to our senses, allowing us a sobering and usually painful glimpse of what is possible in the new life we build from the ashes of the old.

What Kathleen Norris says makes sense. When we see that this world is imperfect and passing away, we yearn for a new world, a new heaven and a new earth. We wait in joyful hope.

Rejoice, the Lord is near. His reign is here at hand.
That dazzling vision, coming clear,
Reveals what God has planned.

Let heaven hear our voice. Now greet God's only Son.
Let every human heart rejoice. Proclaim what God has done!
Where angels rally round, where heaven sings on high,
We rise, we join that joyful sound. His welcome splits the sky!
Our Savior comes as King; his reign, by right restored.
